Orgill Fall Dealer Market exhibitors donate 48 tons of products to Habitat for Humanity Greater Boston through MCCA's Conventions C.A.R.E. program

Donated materials will help build more Habitat homes

After a successful event at the Boston Convention & Exhibition Center (BCEC), exhibitors from the Orgill Fall Dealer Market donated 12 tractor-trailer loads of products for Habitat for Humanity Greater Boston. Orgill, Inc. provides worldwide distribution and retail services to the home improvement industry and has held its annual Fall Dealer Market in Boston in 2009 and 2011. This year's exhibition, held August 18-20 at the BCEC, filled the 516,000 square foot BCEC exhibit hall and brought over 20,000 attendees to Boston.

Orgill's donations were made through the Massachusetts Convention Center Authority's (MCCA) Conventions C.A.R.E. (Community Assistance by Responsible Events) program, which was established by the MCCA to link convention and trade show exhibitors with local non-profits. Exhibitors are saved the time and expense of shipping unneeded goods after a show ends, while local non-profits benefit from useful donations, like boxes of toiletries or office supplies. The MCCA and its partners in turn help divert these items from local landfills.

The donations included items typically sold in hardware stores such as tools, power equipment, lawn and garden supplies, outdoor furnishings, and more. Habitat will sell most of the donated items to the general public at Habitat Greater Boston's ReStore, located at 1580 VFW Parkway, West Roxbury, Massachusetts at a fraction of their retail value. Proceeds from ReStore sales are used to build more Habitat homes in Greater Boston.

"At Orgill, we have been donating to Habitat for Humanity for the past ten years and have always been staunch believers in their work and mission," said Steve East, vice president of advertising for Orgill. "It's a great feeling to work hand-in-hand with a host city like Boston, and have a positive impact by giving to a local Habitat affiliate."

"I can't imagine an event and a nonprofit organization better suited for one another" said James E. Rooney, executive director of the MCCA, which owns and operates the BCEC. "This is a record-setting donation for our Conventions C.A.R.E. program. We're extremely grateful to Orgill and the incredible generosity of their exhibitors."
